"It required getting creative at times, I probably didn't get a lot of sleep during high school, but Dr. Brookev and Mr. Stone made it all work." Eric noted he had enjoyed a

benefit that few other students experienced. "I love being involved in both. The choir room and the band room were places where I felt completely at home. I spent most of my free time in one of those rooms, but I loved it."

Concert Choir was home to Eric his sophomore year, one in which he remembers being critical in his development. "If it's not already obvious," Eric says, "Dr. Brookey is one of the more special teachers I ever had. I was amazed at how much he cared about the students individually, as people, and how much he cared for the performances and the quality of the music. And those two things were never in competition with each other."

Next stop was Chamber Singers and the infamous Chamber retreats which provided Eric a lifelong memory. "We were standing in the chapel in our chamber sweatshirts, singing Sleep by Eric Whitacre, and in that moment, something really special happened. It's hard to explain, but we felt it. Dr. Brookey was crying. It had a big impact."

Once he arrived in Baltimore, Eric was more than a little busy, including working Sundays. Church services provide an up and coming audio engineer plenty of opportunities for work and Eric took full advantage. Three churches throughout the greater Baltimore area called Eric their Audio Engineer.
